Trail Clearing on Indian Creek and Cub Creek trails

On June 17th a team of six Front Range Back Country Horsemen set out for a trail clearing ride on the Indian Creek Trail in the Mt. Evans Wilderness. Team members were Dan Shier, Carol Emmons, Steve Emmons, Karen Chaney, Jennifer Keys, and myself. The Indian Creek trail runs about four miles out from our starting point in the Mt. Evans State Wildlife Area and terminates at the junction with the Cub Creek Trail.



Although our original plan was to clear only the Indian Creek trail, a trail patrol report conducted two days earlier by Friends of Mt. Evans indicated there were very few downed trees on Indian Creek. However, that same patrol reported 19 downed trees on the Cub Creek trail section going southwest from the end point of the Indian Creek Trail.

Since we knew our ride out Indian Creek would be quick because of the lack of downed trees, so we decided to clear as much of that Cub Creek Trail section as possible, although we knew that would

make for a fairly long day.

Our outbound ride up Indian Creek and Cub Creek was roughly 7 miles during which we cut and cleared 17 trees, several of which were 12" to 24" in diameter. Our big 42", two-person saw did a lot of work that day. We rode a total of 15 miles and spent a bit over eight hours on the trails that day, including a nice lunch amid the thick pines on the Cub Creek Trail.

In the end we had to make our turn-around just a half mile short of completing that section of the Cub Creek Trail, leaving four downed trees yet to be cleared. It was a lot of work and a lot of riding, but everyone felt great about our teamwork in tackling that big workload, and we all had a ton of fun.

Keep an eye on the FRBCH Activity Sign up list for a new ride we intend to establish in the coming weeks to take out those last four trees and work into another section of the Cub Creek Trail that also requires our attention.

Trail Clearing – Captain Mountain East

On Tuesday, June 21, Bill Klink and I met at the Groundhog Flats trailhead to finish the clearing of the Captain Mountain trail – this time from the east. The day was forecast to be cloudy and cool, which we looked forward to after the recent hot temperatures in Denver.



The trail up toward Captain Mountain was not only cool and refreshing, the ground fog was in which made the scene wonderful. The wildflowers were all out on the hillsides and we enjoyed the trail up with only a few cuts to clear the way.

As we worked our way up the trail the skies gradually cleared until we had very good visibility toward the end of the day. We stopped for lunch at the clearing where we had finished work previously, we could now celebrate the entire Captain Mountain trail cleared.

Just as we were sitting down to a quick sandwich before heading back downhill, we had a surprise guest join in – a large brown bear ambled into the clearing before he knew we were there! Not sure who was more surprised, him or us – but one loud exclamation and he was off back into the woods, The horses barely had time to notice him, but were sure on the alert the whole trip home!

At the Captain Mountain trailhead, Bill and I decided to do another short section down the Lost Creek trail, where I had seen one downed tree on a previous hike. Clearing that, we took the alternate trail back to the trailers. An overall ride of 18 miles, but only a dozen or so trees to cut, only 3 large enough to use the big saw. Overall, a very enjoyable and unique ride that we will long remember!

Need for Mount Evans Weed Management Support

For some years now, FRBCH has supported the weed management effort of Friends of Mt Evans and Lost Creek Wilderness Areas (FOMELC). We pack in water for the back pack spray teams as well as inserting a extracting a contract team treating the meadows along the Captain Mountain Trail. This year we will be taking that two person team in from the Echo Lake Trailhead on July 19 and taking them out two days later. WE need two packhorses and four saddle horses, two of which must be suitable for novice riders. Pack loads will be simple, consisting of the team's camping gear and 160# of water in ladders. No lashing necessary. This part of the trail is a couple of miles down to the valley floor, mostly easy, but with one steep rocky stretch and a pretty ride along the Beaver Dam creek valley. Normal drill is 10am launch, 2 hours to campsite, lunch and return with empty packs. Extraction in the 21st is same timing with only one pack horse. Dan Lincoln will lead this mission, but he needs more of the right horses and/or some trailer space.. Please contact him if you can help at either end of this operation: 303-674-3834; dan@sinbadtravel.net. FRBCH has the necessary packing gear. NOTE: Let Dan L know if you are interested in supporting the weed control operation now or in the future. There are other water caches that need to be packed in.

Great American Outdoors Act Fact Sheet

About the Act

The USDA Forest Service is implementing the [Great American Outdoors Act \(GAOA\)](#), which enables federal land managers to take aggressive steps to address deferred maintenance on national forests and grasslands, from 2021 through 2025. The GAOA provides permanent full funding for the Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) and establishes the National Parks and Public Land and Legacy Restoration Fund (LRF) to address the deferred maintenance backlog for five federal agencies. Deferred maintenance is the continual delay of maintenance of Forest Service infrastructure assets. It prevents buildings, roads, bridges, and other assets from reaching their expected useful lifespans.

The USDA Forest Service will use these funds to maximize the benefits experienced by millions of Americans who visit and use their national forests. Projects funded by the GAOA LRF will not only reduce deferred maintenance but will also focus on improving recreation opportunities, access, and economic benefits to local communities..

Rocky Mountain Region At- A- Glance

Rocky Mountain Region which includes National Forest system lands in Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska, South Dakota, and portions of Wyoming is the most visited region in the National Forest System with 30 million visits annually putting pressure on recreation infrastructure. The Rocky Mountain Region administers:

540 campgrounds	60 boat launches	32,000 miles of roads	119 FS-owned Dams and 478
179 picnic areas	2 national recreation areas	370 road bridges and 760	permitted Dams
521 trailheads & 21,100 miles of trails	2 national monuments	trail bridges	1,300 other facilities of other types

National Parks and Public Lands Legacy Restoration Fund (LRF)

The deferred maintenance backlog in the region is estimated at \$527.4 million. The region expects to receive \$30M annually in LRF funds in Fiscal Years 21-25.

- In Fiscal Year 21, 90 projects worth \$31.5 million were funded.
- The Region has 70 projects worth \$26.9 million for Fiscal Year 22 in the President's Budget
- Forests and Grasslands submit proposals for consideration for Fiscal Year 23 funding by July 11.

Dan Shier is Ride Leader for this Recreational Ride on the Rosalie Trail in Mount Evans Wilderness area. Pack a lunch. Directions to the trailhead: Proceed SW on US285 past the traffic light at Pine Junction. Turn right at the next traffic light, several miles down the road. You will see a gas station on the right (north). Proceed 6.8 miles to a point where there are about 40 mailboxes on the right side and the right hand fork starts up a steep hill. Take the left hand fork which is paved. Proceed up that road past the campground (where the road turns to gravel) to the big trailhead parking lot. There should be lots of parking space for rigs large and small.

The trail is a fairly easy one, ending at or near timberline, depending on whether we want to go the last half mile from the high meadow to the saddle. Many openings in the forest provide some spectacular views. Round trip is 11 or 12 miles.

Ride Leader is John Case. From Denver, take I-70 west to evergreen Pkwy. exit; go 6 miles south on HWY 74 to Evergreen Lake; when you can first see Evergreen Lake, slow down for your turn. Turn right on Upper Bear Creek Rd. Go 6.5 miles to CR480. Look for a yellow sign that says "School bus turn-around". About 150 feet past that sign, turn right at the signs that say "Sawmill" and "Outdoor Lab". This is CR480. Drive on for 3 miles. (Julie S.'s note: I don't think the road is marked CR480 here, but at this approx. mileage there is a Singing River Ranch sign and a "Y" in the road. Bear right. On up the road, you will see a sign for the Mt. Evans state wildlife area where you turn left. Proceed about 1/2 mile to the buildings. In the summer of 2020 the two traffic-calming bumps near the buildings are something you will want to cross over quite slowly. Shift into 4WD and go up the hill for about 1/4 mile. The road surface is good but it is just steep with a climbing switchback near the top. Park in the level area at the top by the toilets. Figure it will take 20-25 minutes to get to the parking area from Evergreen because the road winds a good bit and speeds have to be slow.

There is some open meadow the first two miles. Past there it is all forest. It is a fairly easy trail and usually has enough deadfalls to make it a long day. Round trip is about 12 miles.

Pack a lunch. Be ready to ride at 9:30.




