trips starting in June. Also remember your spring vaccinations and Coggins test for the year, so you'll be all ready to ride!

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

It was the perfect day for the 18 riders who participated in the Mike Brashear Horsemanship Trail Riding Clinic! This clinic was a success based on the many positive comments that were heard throughout the day by those that participated! The idea for this clinic came in as a mere suggestion of "wouldn't it be great if we could have Mike Brashear do a clinic for FRBCH?" That suggestion got the ball rolling last fall!! This clinic would not have been put together without excellent organizational skills of Karen Chaney. Several others pitched in to secure the venue, Courtney Cowgill, Karen Chaney and Donna Fleischer. The preselected trail was ridden and obstacles marked by Karen Chaney, Sandra Bankhead and Kim Berg. Joan Wealing was relied upon to ensure fees were reasonable and handled the "legalese" to make sure all "i's" were dotted and "t's" were crossed on waivers required by Happy Dog Ranch, Mike Brashear Horsemanship and FRBCH.

Mike regaled us with tips, jokes, Bible quotes and tales all mixed together with his insightful horse training. Everyone started with on the ground training which Mike equates with a pilot's preflight checklist. There were lots of questions and everyone had the opportunity to practice each step, work with Mike and correct, as necessary.

At lunch everyone sat together with Mike for more fun. John Spillane, owner of <u>Happy Dog Ranch Foundation</u> (HDR), gave us a short history and description of HDR's mission. (Please see their website for more information and to make a donation to their worthwhile cause.) After lunch everyone mounted up for more training with Mike.

Several riders had specific problems which Mike was able to address; such as the buddy sour horse, horses that don't want to stand still, training your horse to come to and stand at the mounting block and much more. In late afternoon, 13 riders participated in a 2-hour trail ride which included several water crossings, riding in sand bars, stepping over logs, ditches, hills, three bridges and a train. Some riders spent extra time with Mike while the trail riders were out and one horse and owner got one on one trailer loading training from Mike! We are looking forward to having Mike back in the future for more specific training related to FRBCH mission! Mike Brashear Horsemanship is available to do private training sessions at his place in Ft. Lupton. He quoted \$75 per hour to FRBCH members.

American Horse Council Annual Conference Denver June 4-6, 2023 Held at Le Meridien Hotel, 1465 California Street, Denver, Colorado.

The American Horse Council Annual Meeting at the Le Meridian Hotel (https://horsecouncil.org/annual-meeting/american-horse-council-2023-conference/). They have committee meetings and related discussions on Sunday and Tuesday, with Monday being the main conference event, there will be some very interesting topics being discussed. There are fees to attend this conference, but it seems a good opportunity to meet some interesting people and to get a broader perspective on the horse community in the country.

As an example of their work, American Horse Council did an extensive survey of the economic impact of the horse community, nationwide, in 2017, and they are re-doing that survey this year. **Here is a link to their economic impact study survey**

Centaurea solstitialis, the yellow star-thistle, is a species of thorny plant in the genus Centaurea, which is part of the family Asteraceae. A winter annual, it is native to the Mediterranean Basin region and invasive in many other places.

Yellow star thistle has been found in our vicinity (Jefferson, Douglas and Arapaho Counties, as well as in other areas of Colorado). See website for more information including map of where reported. Please be on the lookout for this and report it immediately if you see it (see website for how to report). This is a List A noxious weed in Colorado and a single plant produces 100,000 airborne seeds. Of particular concern to horse owners is this weed is toxic to horses and other animals. It causes an irreversible and serious brain lesion. Nigropalladial-encephalomalacia. This is a long word to describe death of dopamine producing neurons.

WILDFIRE SAFETY

With the warmer months, also comes the threat of wildfire. There are two meetings regarding wildfire issues coming up in the next few weeks that we should all know about and consider attending. These are being put on by Evergreen Fire and Rescue and are open to the public.

The first is a community forum on May 23rd at Evergreen High School. This will primarily be a question-and-answer forum with representatives from local, county, state, federal and utility company representatives present.



The second informational meeting will be on June 3rd at the Evergreen Fire and Rescue admin building in Bergen Park (address on flyer). This is on defensible space and home hardening. It is really valuable information on what to do and how to protect your house in the event of a wildfire.

Lady Long Rider

Riding 2,000 miles on horseback from Montana to New Mexico sounds like a crazy but thrilling dream or pure hardship and exhaustion. According to Bernice Ende, the trip was all that and more. Since swinging her leg over the saddle for that first long ride in 2005 (at the age of 50), Ende has logged more than 29,000 miles in the saddle, crisscrossing North America on horseback - alone. More than once she has traversed the Great Plains, the Southwest deserts, the Cascade Range, and the Rocky Mountains. Along the way, she discovered a sense of community and love of place that unites people wherever they live.

In Ethiopia with a Mule

Dervla Murphy set out with her pack-mule Jock on a hazardous trek through Ethiopia's remote and hostile regions. Inspired by stories of Prester John and the Queen of Sheba,

she hoped to find beauty, danger, solitude, and mystery. Instead, she encountered rough terrain, exhaustion, illness, and the disorder of the Ethiopians' domestic affairs - all of which she conquered with endurance and good humor. Despite being robbed three times, Murphy found the Ethiopian highlanders were unusually hospitable. Out of her dependence on them and her increasing familiarity with their way of life grew a close and warm understanding. On reaching Addis Ababa, she concluded that affection for Ethiopia's people was the richest reward of her journey.

On the Trail of Genghis Khan

The relationship between man and horse on the Eurasian steppe gave rise to a succession of rich nomadic cultures. Among them were the Mongols of the thirteenth century - a small tribe, which, under the charismatic leadership of Genghis Khan, created the largest contiguous land empire in history. Inspired by the extraordinary life nomads lead, Tim Cope embarked on a journey that hadn't been successfully completed since those times: to travel on horseback across the entire length of the Eurasian steppe, from Karakorum, the ancient capital of Mongolia, through Kazakhstan, Russia, Crimea and the Ukraine to the Danube River in Hungary. A journey of adventure, endurance and eventual triumph, On the Trail of Genghis Khan is at once a celebration of and an elegy for an ancient way of life.




