 - ◆ Lunch at 12:30 at the equestrian parking lot.



For those of you who may have missed it, the American Horse Council did an **extensive** survey of the economic impact of the horse community, nationwide, in 2017. The survey is open until September 29, 2023. What I did was go to the survey, print it out so I could gather my historic information for 2022, then I reentered the website page and entered my information into their categories. There are categories for Equine businesses as well as individuals with horses. The purpose of this survey is to quantify how much the Equine Industry adds to the national GDP.

NOXIOUS WEED IN COLORADO



Be on the lookout, and yes, this is a repeat of last month's article... Centaurea solstitialis, the yellow star-thistle, is a species of thorny plant in the genus Centaurea, which is part of the family Asteraceae. A winter annual, it is native to the Mediterranean Basin region and invasive in many other places.

Yellow star thistle has been found in our vicinity (Jefferson, Douglas and Arapaho Counties, as well as in other areas of Colorado). See website for more information including map of where reported. Please be on the lookout for this and report it immediately if you see it (see website for how to report). This is a List A noxious weed in Colorado and a single plant produces 100,000 airborne seeds. Of particular concern to horse owners is this weed is toxic to horses and other animals. It causes an irreversible and serious brain lesion. Nigropalladial-encephalomalacia. This is a long word to describe death of dopamine producing neurons.

Unbreakable: The Woman Who Defied the Nazis in the World's Most Dangerous Horse Race by Richard Askwith

The courageous and heartbreaking story of a Czech countess who defied the Nazis in a legendary horse race. Czechoslovakia, October 1937. Vast crowds have gathered to watch the threatened nation's most prestigious sporting contest: the Grand Pardubice steeplechase. Notoriously dangerous, the race is considered the ultimate test of manhood and fighting spirit. The Nazis have sent their paramilitary elite-SS officers on a mission to crush the "subhuman Slavs". The local cavalry officers have no hope of stopping them. But there is one other contestant: a countess riding a little golden mare...The story of Lata Brandisov is by turns enigmatic and inspiring. Born into privilege, she spent much of her life in poverty. Modest and shy, she refused to accept the constraints society placed on her because of her gender. Instead, with quiet courage, she repeatedly achieved what others said was impossible and rose above scandal to became her nation's figurehead in its darkest hour. Unbreakable is a story of endurance and defiance in an age of prejudice, fear, sexism, class hatred, and nationalism. Filled with eccentric aristocrats, socialite spies, daredevil jockeys-and a race so brutal that some consider merely taking part in it a sign of insanity-Unbreakable brings to life a unique hero, and an unforgettable love affair between a woman and a horse.

The Perfect Horse: The Daring U.S. Mission to Rescue the Priceless Stallions Kidnapped by the Nazis by Elizabeth Letts

The remarkable story of the heroic rescue of priceless horses in the closing days of World War II. In the chaotic last days of the war, a small troop of battle-weary American soldiers captures a German spy and makes an astonishing find--his briefcase is empty but for photos of beautiful white horses that have been stolen and kept on a secret farm behind enemy lines. 
